ABRAHAM AND SARAH

This packet was designed to be an easy way to teach foundational Bible stories to kids in first, second, and third grades. Each lesson in this series is structured the same and can be taught in about 40 minutes!

Step One: Read or watch the Bible story.

Gather your group together and read the story of Abraham and Sarah from your children's Bible. It may be split into two shorter stories. Read both.

Would you rather watch it? Many animated Bible stories are available for free on YouTube. Try searching "Abraham and Sarah Bible Story for Kids" in the YouTube search bar. Be sure to watch it fully before showing it to your class to ensure it's appropriate.

Background Information:

God chose Abraham to be the father of Israel, God's chosen people. God's promise to Abraham seemed impossible to believe because Abraham and Sarah were so old. Abraham was 75 years old when God made this promise. Abraham was 100 years old, and Sarah was 90. This means that Abraham had to wait for 25 years before God kept His promise!

The name Isaac means 'laughter'. (Sarah laughed when she found out she would have a baby)

Step Two: Explore the story.

After reading or watching the story, use the retell the story worksheet to retell the main parts of today's story. This can be done individually or in small groups. Don't want to print it out? Try mapping out the story together on a piece of large paper or a whiteboard.

Abraham and Sarah: Quickly map out the 6 main parts of the Story. (Abraham and Sarah wanted kids, God promised to make Abraham a great nation, Abraham and Sarah waited and waited, the visitors said Abraham and Sarah would have a baby the next year, Sarah laughed, God kept His promise and Isaac was born.)

Then, talk through the discussion questions as a group.

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Step Three: Do the craft - Abraham and Sarah Lift the Flap

Before the lesson: Select a craft template (full color or black and white). Print out both pieces for your kids. I suggest using heavy paper.

In this craft, your kids will create a simple paper craft that shows Abraham and Sarah's big miracle.

First, ask students to color both pictures of Abraham and Sarah. Next, ask them to cut out the pictures (including the small flap on the top).

Use the flap to glue one picture on top of the other. When the kids are done, they should be able to flip the picture of Abraham and Sarah up to show the second picture of them holding their miracle baby!



Step Four: Finish with the take-home worksheet.

The 'Abraham and Sarah' coloring page is the perfect way to wrap up the lesson and create a take-home page that includes caregivers in what you have learned. Students will color a picture, write down their memory verse, and add the key takeaway (a "big idea") from the story.

There are three versions to choose from!

Choose the one that works best for your class: [a blank version](#) (add your own memory verse and big idea), [a pre-filled NIV version](#), or a [pre-filled KJV version](#).

Memory verse suggestion from the story:

Genesis 21:2(NIV) Now the Lord was gracious to Sarah as he had said, and the Lord did for Sarah what he had promised.

Big idea suggestion: With God, anything is possible.
